The Third Day He Rose Again from the Dead *Part nine in a series on the Apostles' Creed*

What do the Scriptures teach about Christ's resurrection?

They teach that on the third day Christ victoriously rose from the grave and showed Himself alive to His disciples.

Why is Christ's resurrection so important and comforting?

Christ's resurrection proves that

- A. Christ is the Son of God;
- B. His doctrine is the truth;
- C. God the Father accepted Christ's sacrifice for the reconciliation of the world;
- D. all believers in Christ will rise to eternal life. (From an Explanation of the Small Catechism, questions 144-145)

The book of Acts records how the apostles proclaimed the Gospel throughout the world, and it is interesting to note how frequently the word "resurrection" is used to describe the central message of the apostles. Acts 4:33 says, "with great power the apostles continued to testify to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and much grace was upon them all." Those who were agitated by the preaching of Paul complained that he "was preaching the good news about Jesus and the resurrection" (Acts 17:18). When we describe the central work of Christ, we may sum it up by saying something like, "Jesus died for my sins." We may even recall Paul's words to the Corinthians when he said, "I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except Jesus Christ and him crucified." These statements are entirely true, and no doubt the apostles boldly spoke of the cross where Jesus died, but it was the resurrection which they testified to over and over again. Why?

The resurrection was the proof that everything that Jesus said was true and that the divine mission he came to accomplish was complete. There were many who saw Jesus die, but if Jesus had only died, it still would have meant nothing for us. Paul says in 1 Corinthians 15:17, "if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins." We would have no reason to celebrate. We would have no hope.

Jesus repeatedly claimed to be the Son of God. If this was not true, God would not have permitted Him to rise. If Jesus had not been a sufficient sacrifice, God would not have raised Him from the dead. But God did raise Jesus up from death, and his resurrection is final proof for us that everything He taught was true, and that we have forgiveness of sin and eternal life.

The skeptics have all kinds of theories that try to explain away Jesus' resurrection. Very few will deny that Jesus actually was an historical figure who lived and died. What is difficult for them to believe is that He lives again. But Jesus proved that He lives by appearing to the disciples. He showed that he was not just a mere phantom. Touching his hands and side the disciples knew that he had bodily risen and was alive. Not only did he appear to his disciples, but 1 Corinthians 15:6 says that he appeared to more than five hundred people at one time. The disciples have left their testimony for us so that we may rejoice that Jesus has risen from the dead.

Jesus told his disciples, "Because I live, you also will live." This sums up the hope we have because of the resurrection. Since Jesus rose, we can be confident that we have life. We can be confident that death has been conquered, and that our bodies too will rise to live with him for all eternity. We rejoice at the promise Jesus gave when he said, "I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me will live, even though he dies; and whoever lives and believes in me will never die."

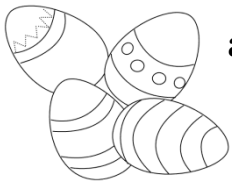

Did You Know...

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday and continues through Holy Thursday (when Holy Communion was instituted at the Last Supper) and Good Friday, when Jesus was tried, crucified, and buried.

Because the Last Supper was celebrated during the Feast of the Passover, which is calculated on the phases of the moon, Easter is called a movable feast. Lent is scheduled backwards from Easter. Easter falls on the first Sunday after the full moon after the spring equinox. The forty days of fasting and penitence during Lent do not include Sundays. Christians always celebrate Sunday as the day Jesus rose from the dead, so it is never a day of fasting.



The Board of Fellowship and the Mount Olive Youth will be coordinating and serving the Easter Breakfast this year. Palm Sunday is your last chance to purchase a lily for the sanctuary. Lilies are \$8 each and you can give your payment to Kellee Zweifel. If you wish to give a lily in memory of a loved one, please write your name and the name of your loved one on the lily signup sheet in the fellowship hall. Lilies may be taken home after the service on Easter Sunday.

From the Board of Stewardship

In April the season of Lent ends and the season of Easter begins. Lent is a time for repentance and reflection. During Lent we have a lengthy opportunity to take a careful look at ourselves and realize that way too often we fall short of our Lord's expectations. We do what we should not be doing and we fail to do what we should be doing. This is true also for us as stewards. Rather than being generous in our use of time, talents and money we often selfishly use our lives and resources for ourselves rather than for God's purposes. God blesses us with all of life and life's resources so that we might be a blessing to others. Our old sin natures urge us to use all these things first for ourselves and then, if there is something left over, for others and God's purposes.

We recognize with St. Paul that ***"it is required that those who have been given a trust must prove faithful."*** (1 ***Corinthians 4:2***) We have been entrusted with all of life and life's resources (all owned by God) with the expectation that we will use them wisely and well. Way too often we fail to do what God expects. The good news is that when on Good Friday Jesus said ***"It is finished"*** He meant that with His holy life and sacrificial death He paid the full price our sins and guilt. So, when our past failures as God's stewards bother us, we can take those sins and

shortcomings to our Lord in prayer, repent of them and receive the assurance that we are made right with God through the sacrifice of Jesus. Forgiveness is the best way to handle our past failures!

Easter brings us a breath of fresh air filled with joy and hope! As St. Paul wrote: ***"He [Jesus] was delivered over to death for our sins and was raised to life for our justification."*** (Romans 4:25) That truth makes us into Easter people—people filled with joy and hope! Our memory of past shortcomings makes us feel guilty and ashamed. Easter replaces our failures and makes us into people of hope and hope is stronger than memory because ***"Hope in Christ does not disappoint us because God has poured out His love into our hearts by the Holy Spirit, whom He has given us."*** (Romans 5:5)

On Easter we greet each other by saying that ***Jesus Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!*** Because of Christ's Easter victory we have the sure hope that we are redeemed stewards who, in cooperation with and encouragement from our fellow redeemed stewards, freely and joyfully manage all of life and life's resources for God's purposes.

Dear fellow stewards, a happy Easter to you all!

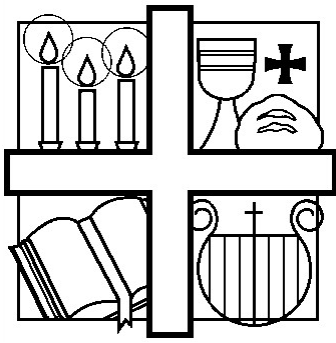

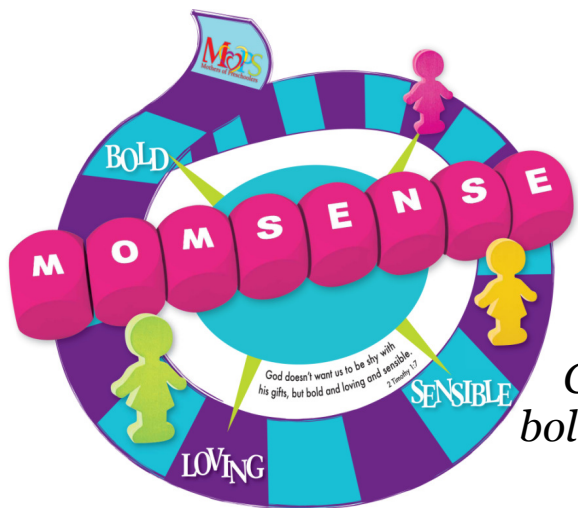
Thesis IV

Lutheran Worship Is Characterized by Reverence and Dignity

Building on our first three theses, it is important now to say that Lutheran worship needs to be characterized by reverence and dignity. I am concerned when I notice a movement away from a sense of reverence and dignity in our Lutheran worship. Let me speak plainly. I am troubled when I notice some of our pastors conducting the liturgy as if they were entertaining friends in their home, with little quips and humorous asides sprinkled throughout the service. This robs the people of the opportunity to focus their thoughts on Jesus Christ. Such self-indulgence has no place in our worship services. A sense of reverent awe and dignity needs to permeate our Lutheran worship services.

Our Lutheran worship services should be known as truly sacred events, marked by a deep sense of the holiness and majesty of God. We need to realize that when we attend the worship service, truly holy things are going on. God is with us. He is present among us through Word and Sacrament. The great struggle of God against Satan is taking place as life and salvation are given out. These are serious matters. The angels in heaven sing, "Holy, holy, holy is God the Lord of Sabaoth!" and cover their faces at the sight of the holy God. Dare we behave in a manner that clearly conflicts with this wonderful sense of reverence and dignity?

WHAT'S THAT BIG ORANGE BOX IN OUR PARKING LOT?

The 72 Hour Fund offers vital, tangible, hands-on assistance for former inmates to help them take positive steps towards successful reintegration. For example, women receive a voucher for a free haircut and a manicure. This small “cup of cold water” (see Matthew 10:42) immediately begins restoring of dignity and self-respect. Clothes, bus tokens, job counseling, housing, food and other basic essentials are available on a needs-driven basis for all who make an appointment. Since April 2004, when this service was established in the Denver area, more than 1,500 men and women have received help through the outreach of the 72 Hour Fund. Less than 20% have returned to prison.

ATRS & 72-Hour Fund Partners for the Good Work: American Textile Recycling Services (ATRS) has partnered with the 72-Hour Fund to help raise money for their good works through the recycling and reuse of clothing and shoes. In addition to the financial support given to the 72-Hour Fund every year, ATRS redirects tons of used and unwanted textiles that could otherwise be destined for local landfills. This is beneficial to both the environment and the local community. The recyclers are strategically located throughout various neighborhoods and provide a convenient way for residents to recycle their unwanted garments, while at the same time support a local charity.

Mount Olive has provided a location for the 72-Hour Fund Recycler Box so people in our community can support this good work.

Couple's LCEF investment helps assist those in need



After a deadly tornado whipped through Joplin, Mo., May 22, a couple living in the St. Louis area felt that in a very minute way, they were contributing to disaster relief. That's because LCEF is providing special loans for those impacted and they, the Woodcocks, were LCEF investors.

Rolland and Miriam Woodcock learned about LCEF about 25 years ago when their church, Zion Lutheran, Maryland Heights, built an addition. The loan for the project, secured by LCEF, sparked an interest for the Woodcocks. They decided investing in an organization that provided money for church-related projects was a good idea.

"Interest rates were comparable to what we could get from banks and we don't do high-risk investing," said Rolland. In addition to their joint investment, they put Rolland's retirement funds in an LCEF IRA.

The Woodcocks have been a part of Zion's growth from a "country" church to one surrounded by subdivisions and apartments. Its membership now stands at about 230.

Rolland has served as a church elder, congregation president, treasurer and financial secretary. He was the building committee chair when the current church was dedicated in 1960. He sings in the choir, ushers and is always available with his pickup truck now that he's retired. "Whenever they need something done, someone says, 'Call Rolland,'" he said with a chuckle.

Miriam is a long-time member of Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) and sings in the choir. She also serves as a Sunday morning greeter and for kitchen duty.

They are role models for their son and his family in their service to their church and the broader church by investing with LCEF.

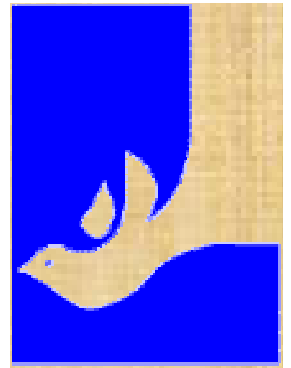
"We're not noisy or outstanding," said Rolland. "We just quietly plug along."

The following are Life Thoughts for April:

Life Thoughts are based on one of the lessons for each Sunday.

April 1 – Palm Sunday/Sunday of the Passion – Jesus making “himself nothing” and “taking on the form of a servant” (Philippians 2:7) began at His conception. Here is opportunity to point out the extent of Jesus’ humiliation and, subsequently, the value He gives to human life at this moment.

April 8 – The Resurrection of our Lord – We have a risen Savior who defeated death! He gives us this victory! We need not fear death! We have a living Savior. He promises us His presence. We need not fear life!

April 15 – Second Sunday of Easter – “He is the propitiation for our sins, and not for ours only but for the sins of the whole world” (1 John 2:2). Jesus atoned for the sins of every human being whether they know it or not. What value this gives to every human being.

April 22 – Third Sunday of Easter – What an “aha” moment it must have been for the disciples when Jesus “opened their minds to understand the Scriptures” (Luke 24:45). They realized the connection. The Scriptures were all about Him! What an “aha” moment when we realize that Jesus is all about us! We can trust in Him no matter what our circumstances.

April 29 – Fourth Sunday of Easter – When the valleys grew dark on the evening journeys back down to the sheep fold, shepherds would beat out a rhythm with their rod and staff (Psalm 23:4). Even though the sheep could not see their shepherd, they knew he was there. No matter how dark things may seem in our lives, the Good Shepherd comforts us with His promises, a constant, resonating reminder that He still leads.

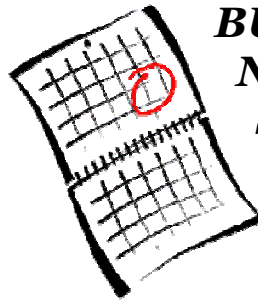
