I Believe in Jesus Christ . . .

Suffered Under Pontius Pilate Part six in a series on the Apostles' Creed

What do the Scriptures teach about Christ's life, suffering, and death?

They teach that Christ

- A. endured poverty, contempt, and persecution in His earthly life;
- B. suffered great agony of body and soul under Pontius Pilate;
- C. died in excruciating agony on the cross.

(From an Explanation of the Small Catechism, question 131)

Several years ago when the movie "Passion of the Christ" was released in theatres, it sparked a lot of controversy. The movie contained the most violent depictions of the crucifixion ever put on film. Some thought that the violence was over the top and unnecessary. Others felt that it was important to show how brutally violent a crucifixion was and the type of suffering that Jesus endured. The movie was appropriately named. Though we often use the word "passion" in connection with intense emotion or desire, it actually comes from the Latin which means "suffer." The movie certainly showed the physical suffering that Jesus endured.

In the early church a heresy arose called Docetism. The Docetists taught that the body of Christ was not real flesh and blood, and that Jesus had only the appearance of a man. Consequently, they said that Jesus did not really suffer, die, and rise again. Such heresy existed already in the time of the apostles, for the apostle John writes, "This is how you can recognize the Spirit of God: Every spirit that acknowledges that Jesus Christ has come in the flesh is from God, but every spirit that does not acknowledge Jesus is not from God. This is the spirit of the antichrist, which you have heard is coming and even now is already in the world" (1 John 4:2-3).

The suffering of Jesus was real, for Jesus Christ truly came in the flesh. Isaiah 53:3-5 clearly speaks of the suffering of Christ saying, "He was despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows, and familiar with suffering. Like one from whom men hide their faces he was despised, and we esteemed him not. Surely he took up our infirmities and carried our sorrows, yet we considered him stricken by God, smitten by him, and afflicted. But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was upon him, and by his wounds we are healed."

To fully understand the nature of Christ's suffering, we need to understand that it was more than just physical suffering that he endured. Even greater than the physical suffering of Jesus was the spiritual suffering of bearing all of man's sin in himself. Such spiritual suffering can never be visualized in a movie, but it was very real suffering that he endured for us and for our salvation.

Why under Pontius Pilate? Pilate is mentioned in the creed not as a way to place any blame on him, but to provide an historical reference for when these things occurred. It was real suffering, in a real place and time in history. Because of His great love for us, we who believe in Him shall never experience the same kind of suffering of body and soul that Jesus endured on the cross. On the cross he suffered the torments of the damned in hell. By His sacrifice we have been given the joys of heaven. We shall never be separated from the love of God, because Jesus suffered and died for us.

From the Board of Stewardship



How did you do with your resolutions for the year 2011? About the same as for other years? Can you even remember what those resolutions were? Why do we struggle so much with resolutions? Is it because they are not realistic? Is it because we try to do it completely on our own without any outside help (even from God)? Failure is one of the biggest disappointments in life. Is it possible to start over successfully?

As we enter into this New Year we have another opportunity to start over. Having the privilege of starting over is one of the things in life that gives us hope and courage as we look to the future. As we take down our 2011 calendars and replace them with 2012 calendars we really can start over.

In Romans 12:12 (NIV) the Holy Spirit gives us some great ingredients for a really good New Year's resolution. The encouragement is to "*be joyful in hope, patient in affliction and faithful in prayer.*" Life would be so sweet if everyone could adopt and live out those three pieces as a New Year's resolution.

"Be joyful in hope" should be pretty easy for Christians because our hope is in Christ and "*that hope will never disappoint us, because God has poured out His love into our hearts by the Holy Spirit, whom He has given us.*" (Romans 5::5 NIV)

Our comfort is that the power to do that does not come from within us, but from outside of us. When we were baptized "*we were buried with Him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life.*" (Romans 6:4 NIV) No one in the history of mankind had to deal with as much affliction as Jesus, our Savior! And He did it out of love for us so that we do not have to fear eternal affliction!

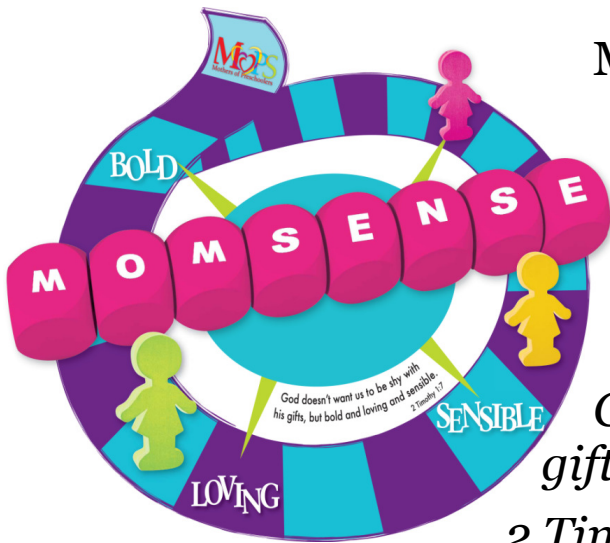

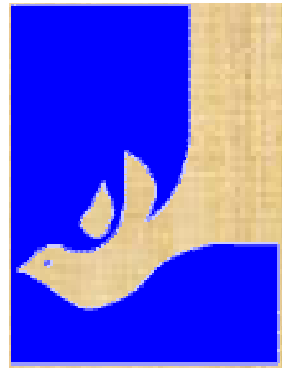

The following are Life Thoughts for January:

(Life Thoughts are based on one of the lessons for each Sunday.)

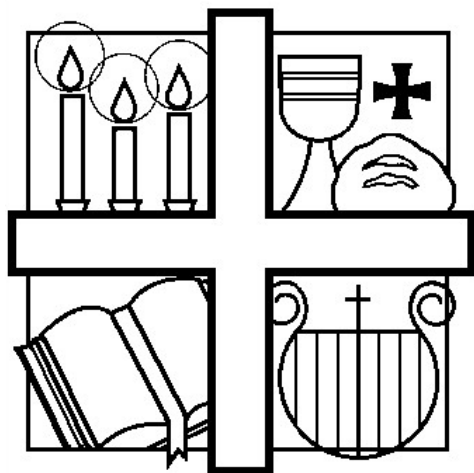
January 1 – Circumcision and Name of Jesus – A pair of jeans may be ragged and torn, but a designer name attached to them gives them value. Our value cannot be found in the ragged and torn garment of our sinful self. But in baptism, our Triune God places His name upon us (Numbers 6:27 and Galatians 3:27) and clothes us in His holiness. His desire to have every human being so named gives value to every human being.

January 8 – The Baptism of our Lord – The death Jesus died, He died "once for all" (Romans 6:10). He purchased "all." Thus, He gives value to "all." Every person we encounter, no matter their size or location or condition of health, is someone for whom Jesus died. Our responsibility is to acknowledge their value and lead them to see its true source.

January 15 – Second Sunday after the Epiphany – The great price paid for humanity's sins (1 Corinthians 6:20) was more than the death of some great martyr who inspired people to better living. The price was "the Son of God" (John 1:49). When the Son of God pays for something with His own blood, the value of that purchase is beyond comprehension.

January 22 – Third Sunday after the Epiphany – The thread of repentance runs through today's readings. That seems appropriate for today is the 39th anniversary of the Roe v. Wade decision legalizing abortion in our country. Since then, over 54 million babies have been destroyed. We could stand in our churches and call the country to repentance. But perhaps repentance needs to start with us, the Church, for allowing it to happen and so many of us remaining so silent ever since. God be merciful to us for Jesus' sake.

January 29 – Fourth Sunday after the Epiphany – An astonishing teaching! He taught as one who had authority (Mark 1:22). He spoke the very words of God (Deuteronomy 18:18). "A new teaching with authority!" (Mark 1:27) Unclean spirits obey Him. Notice how the people laud the teaching not just the Teacher. Through the Word made flesh, God gives us this same authoritative and powerful Word! It changes hearts. It changes lives.



Lutheran Worship: 2000 and Beyond

The first of Seven Theses on Lutheran Worship

Written by Dr. A.L. Barry, former President, Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod
for a presentation to the Real Life Worship Conference Sponsored by the
LCMS Commission on Worship in Denver, Colorado February 1998.

Thesis I: The Main Purpose of Lutheran Worship Is to Receive God's Gifts

If you were to ask most people what worship is, they might say, "Worship is praising the Lord" or "Worship is what human beings do to express their thanks to God" or "Worship is going to church," or something like that. While there is some truth to each of these answers, they do not adequately describe the main purpose of Lutheran worship.

We Lutherans have a unique perspective on worship. We know that God's Word and His holy Sacraments are His precious gifts to us. They are the tools the Holy Spirit uses to give us forgiveness, life and salvation. The main purpose of Lutheran worship is to receive these gifts from God.

Our Lutheran Confessions explain this truth as follows: "The service and worship of the Gospel is to receive good things from God" (Apology to the Augsburg Confession, Article IV.310).

I am not sure whether we have adequately emphasized this important truth. God gives His gifts. We receive them. That is the main purpose of Lutheran worship. He does this as His Gospel is proclaimed, as His Word is read, as His forgiveness is announced and sinners are absolved, and as we receive our Lord's body and blood in Holy Communion. In these wonderful ways, God is present with us, His people, drawing us to Himself and giving us what we need so much—His mercy, forgiveness, love, joy, peace, power and comfort! The purpose of worship, therefore, is to be gathered by God around His gifts.

Having clearly established this important point, I need to say that it would be wrong to assume that we are merely passive participants in the worship service. Listen to the beautiful introduction to Lutheran Worship.

Our Lord speaks and we listen. His Word bestows what it says. Faith that is born from what is heard acknowledges the gifts, received with eager thankfulness and praise... Saying back to Him what he has said to us, we repeat what is most true and sure... The rhythm of our worship is from him to us, and then from us back to him. He gives his gifts, and together we receive and extol them. We build one another up as we speak to one another in psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs (Lutheran Worship, p. 6).

How true! God speaks. We listen. Then we speak the great "amen" of faith, saying, "Yes, yes, this is true!" Praise God for His mercy in permitting us to receive His gifts! Praise God for drawing us together around His gifts!

LUTHERAN CHURCH EXTENSION FUND NEWS

The 2011 LCEF Fall Leadership Conference was held November 18-20, 2011, in Raleigh, North Carolina. Jack and Jan Bloss were privileged to attend as voting delegates from the Rocky Mountain District to the 2011 Annual Meeting.

Approximately 600 people from all across the U.S. attended the conference. The theme of the conference was "Making a REAL Difference!...we cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard". Acts 4:20. Terry Dittmer acted as Master of Ceremonies throughout the weekend, led singing and played the piano.

Keynote addresses were given by J.C. Watts, former All-American football player from the University of Oklahoma; LCEF President/CEO Richard Robertson; LCMS President Rev. Matthew Harrison; Mrs. Reinhild Niebuhr (South Africa); and Rev. Greg Bearss. A Servant Event was held in which 4,000 Christian books were wrapped for distribution in the surrounding area.

Small group sessions were held Saturday and Sunday mornings. Jan attended sessions on "How Technology Has Changed the Church", and "Witness, Mercy, Life Together in the Mission Field" (Dominican Republic). Jack attended "Church and Community Engagement Bible Study" and "Stewardship Primer". Jan also attended the Sunday Women's Luncheon with Mrs. Vonda Skelton, who spoke on "Prayer". Biblical applications and LCEF Mission & Ministry segments were presented during the weekend.

The Raleigh Boy Choir, members chosen by scholarship and excellence performed on Saturday, led by Mr. Robert Unger, Director of Music Ministry, Resurrection Lutheran Church and School, Cary, NC. He also directed the conference choir.

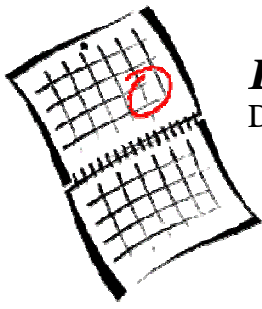
The Sunday morning worship service was uplifting. Music was provided by the Grace Gospel Choir from Grace Lutheran Church, Concord, NC, and the Resurrection Brass Ensemble from Resurrection Lutheran Church, Cary, NC. The Liturgist was The Rev. Dr. John Denninger, Senior Pastor, Prince of Peace Lutheran Church, Springfield, VA, and the Preacher was The Rev. Dr. Jon Diefenthaler, President Southeastern District - LCMS. The sermon title was "The Real Jesus" based on Matt. 25:35-46.

Jan sang in the conference choir, which had a Saturday night rehearsal cut short when the Convention Center was evacuated with lights flashing and a recorded voice repeatedly saying "Leave the building immediately - do not use the elevators- an unknown threat has been reported!" A short rehearsal was held at 7 AM on Sunday morning for the five songs we sang. Many people reported seeing Jan on the big screens during the choir selections!

Jack and Jan are proud to be a part of the LCEF Mission: "To support the Church in fulfilling its mission of sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ by being a Christ-centered servant partner of the LCMS, ensuring that funds and services are available now and in the future."
